The Introduction to Manufacturing (ITM) program is a partnership between the Hanover Area Chamber of Commerce, HACC - Gettysburg Campus, local school districts and area manu-

paths in manufacturing, and local career opportunities within the Hanover marketplace. ITM also provides students with the opportunity to earn 1 – 3 college credits in engineering at HACC.

In addition to class instruction, students visit area manufacturers. Industry representatives provide students with an introduction to their business, a plant tour and information about operations and administration.

## Ethical Decision Making in the Workplace and Society



The “Ethical Decision Making in the Workplace and Society” Symposium is an all-day class that focuses on character building and doing the right thing. Students are placed with a business/community representative who serves as their table leader. They work with business and community volunteers within a field of study that they are hoping to pursue in the future to analyze and discuss real-life ethical scenarios that can occur in the workplace. Involved discussions take place within the groups to prepare for a culminating presentation. Feedback from students who participated in this program was overwhelmingly positive and they feel this is a program that all high school students should experience.

## Introduction to Health Care

Introduction to Healthcare provides high school students the opportunity to earn college credits and nursing assistant certification. The objective of the program is to prepare students for a career in nursing and connect students with potential employment opportunities in senior living communities in the Hanover area.

The purpose of this 104-hour course is to provide the long term care nurse aide trainee with a basic level of knowledge and skills needed to care for an elderly resident/client as set forth by the profession of nursing and regulated by the Commonwealth of PA.

## Workplace and Career Readiness Camp

The Workplace and Career Readiness Camp is a summer program designed to expose incoming sophomores and juniors from Hanover High School and South Western High School to career options - high-demand and non-traditional - within local Hanover businesses and industries.

Students learn what they need to do to be successful in the work world.

### Camp Objectives

1. Identify five high demand careers in the Hanover area.
2. Identify at least three career areas he/she may want to pursue in the future with at least one area being a high-demand career.
3. Identify high school programs/courses they should participate in based on their career interest area.
4. Name post-secondary training and education opportunities within our region, based on their specific career interests.
5. Name non-traditional careers/jobs within each business visited.
6. Analyze soft skills: what they are and why they are essential for employment.
7. Complete a final Power Point presentation to parents, highlights their individual career interests, educational timeline/goals, and overall learning lessons from the summer program.
8. Compare and contrast various educational opportunities that exist within local technical colleges.



## Education Improvement Tax Credit (EITC)

The Hanover Area Chamber of Commerce can receive contributions through the York County Alliance for Learning (YCAL). YCAL is an approved education improvement organization under the Education Improvement Tax Credit Program (EITC).
